# Featured Photographer

#### Wildlife Photography

Most of you will know that wildlife photography and particularly bird photography is my passion. For this display I have chosen photos that illustrate wildlife photography techniques. All these photos are of animals in the wild; none were taken at zoos or wildlife parks.

#### **Equipment and Focus**

I use a Nikon D7500 which is a 1.5 crop sensor camera with an option for a further 1.3 crop. This camera was a deliberate choice for bird photography. I use a Tamron 18-400mm telephoto lens for animals and birds and usually crop the photos both for a closer image and for better composition. For insect macro photography I use a Nikon Micro 105mm lens. For wildlife (not macro) I am currently using back button focus with continuous auto focus. I use a single focus point for still animals and multiple points for birds in flight or fast moving animals.

#### **View Point**

View point is extremely important in wildlife photography. One of the best ways to bring out the personality of the animal or bird is to be at eye level with them whenever possible. This means instead of standing and taking the photo from above, I sit or stoop or even lay on the ground to get to their level. I aim to capture the animal's eyes in the photo. Many wildlife photographers say if you haven't got the eyes you haven't got the shot.

#### The Bush Rat

For the shot of the bush rat taken near the Kilcunda trestle bridge I laid on the ground, 2 metres from the animal. This was as close as I could get before it got skittish. I was using a fast shutter speed of 1/1000<sup>th</sup> of a second to freeze motion which cranked the ISO up to 1800. I liked the blue tint in his eyes and his bony, little "old man's hands."

#### The Echidna

For the echidna I wasn't able to lay flat. The Wonthaggi Wetlands were living up to their name and as it was my boots were full of water and were squelching. Instead I stooped and used the Liveview screen instead of the view finder to get the camera low enough. I used +0.33 exposure compensation to supplement the high ISO as the animal was in the shade of bushes.

#### The Gippsland Water Dragon

This Gippsland Water dragon unexpectedly emerged from Lake Gutheridge in Sale just as Roger and I were walking by on the path. I couldn't get to its level as the bank sloped away. It was less than a metre from us so I was able to get good detail with the telephoto lens out to its full 400mm. This is a heavy crop of the full animal to highlight the pattern of its scales and the vibrant colours of the eye and throat. The full photo was made too busy as there was grass around and in front of the subject. The crop is a cleaner image.

#### The Dusky Moorhen

The dusky moorhen was on the banks of flooding creek many metres below ground level and was completely shaded. Neither high ISO nor exposure compensation was helping so I had to wait for the bird to step into a small sliver of sunshine falling across the rocks. Sometimes you just have to wait for the light.

#### Background, Foreground and Bokeh

Both the extended telephoto lens and the macro lens give a good artistic blurred background referred to as bokeh. Most of my wildlife photos are opportunistic but where possible I look for background that will give an artistic effect. If the surrounds allow it, the subject can be isolated between both foreground and background bokeh.

#### The Female Superb Fairy Wren

Notice the blurred spheres of blue, green, yellow and white light behind the wren. These are the result of a lilly pilly tree with gaps between the leaves to the open sky. The perch the wren is sitting on is at the top of a weeping tree in our back yard which I know is a good spot for photos. The wrens, and other small birds are frequent visitors and I know they will usually end up in this perch. In order not to spook the birds I often photograph through the back window as was the case with this image.

#### The Eastern Grey Kangaroo

The photo of the eastern grey kangaroo illustrates the use of bokeh in both the foreground and background. The roo was on the other side of a levy bank on the edge of the driving range. As the grass on the top of the bank is on a different focal plane to the roo, the bokeh could be obtained. This can be achieved with anything forward of the focal plane such as grass, flowers or of the trees where the light was shining through. To achieve the positioning I want with a stationary subject I move to one side or another.

#### The European Honey Bee

In the macro image of the European honey bee, white flower petals in the foreground provide a soft veiled effect. The blurred foreground is designed to provide context and to draw the eye up to the bee which is in sharp focus. A fast shutter speed of 1/1000<sup>th</sup> of a second is used to freeze the motion of the bee. Although this is a macro photo I pulled back and used auto focus which I find more accurate than my manual focussing attempts. I cropped the photo to get a close-up of the bee.

#### Post Production and Cleaning up the Image

Birds photographed in trees or bushes not only make focusing a challenge but often end up lost in the busyness of the image. Sometimes an otherwise good capture is spoiled by branches that appear to be growing out of the bird's body. I'm not a huge fan of post processing but if it is feasible I will clone away unwanted parts of an image.

#### The Male Superb Fairy Wren

In the original image of the male superb fairy wren a number of twigs behind him appeared to be protruding from his rear end. Since the blurred background of the photo is relatively even and simple it was easy to remove the unwanted twigs using the clone brush. I use Photoscape for post processing which is a free to download program.

#### **Macro Photography Reveals Secrets**

Macro photography can sometimes uncover the unexpected, such as a tiny bug not seen with the naked eye.

#### The Australian Native Resin Bee

When I took the photo of the resin bee in a pig face flower I thought it might be an Australian native bee. I wasn't even sure of that though, let alone what type it was. The photo is a heavy crop but is sharp enough to enable me to identify the insect. It is much smaller than a honey bee and is almost submerged in the centre of the flower.

#### **Respect the Wildlife**

I bought a DSLR to photograph birds. That passion moved on to encompass animals and insects. These wild creatures give me endless hours of enjoyment and in return I give them my respect. These are the rules I set for myself. I never use a flash for wildlife photography, I never deliberately disturb wildlife to get a photo and I never kill an insect to photograph it.

# Free Photo Management Software from Adobe

Gayle talked about her experience with the free to download Adobe Bridge program. Adobe Bridge software is a powerful, easy-to-use media manager. You can edit metadata, add keywords, and add titles and descriptions. Labels and ratings can be assigned to photos. Photos can be organized using collections and searched for using powerful filters and advanced metadata search features. This program works with your photos where they are on your hard drive, it does not require them to be loaded into the program itself.

Gayle is using Abode Bridge to assign keywords to photos. This can be done on multiple photos at one time. Additional keywords can then be added to all or some of the keywords in the batch. For example Gayle went on a macro photo shoot to Shack Bay so assigned keywords related to macro and to Shack Bay to all the photos from that shoot. Then she added specific keywords to individual photos depending on their subject (shells, rocks, plants, bees etc.) This has made searching for individual photos using Adobe Bridge or Windows itself very easy. Descriptions can be assigned to one or many photos at once. Copyright notices can be applied. Photos can be organized into collections (e.g. Birds) without moving them from their original location.

For photographers wishing to upload photos to stock photo sites for sale, this is ideal. The information applied to the photos in Adobe Bridge will automatically populate when uploaded to the stock photo site. This saves a great deal of time if uploading to more than one site. The Adobe Bridge program provides a bulk drag and drop feature for uploading photos for sale on Adobe Stock.

# Tips for Taking Good Family and Holiday Snaps

# Introduction

As we approach the Christmas holiday period it is timely to look at some tips to get the most out of photographing and preserving memories of your family get-togethers and holidays.

These are general, not technical tips. They are gathered from a number of articles. Most are extracts but links to the full articles are provided, should you want to explore the topic in greater detail.

These 26 tips apply equally to any photographic equipment from mobile phone cameras to DSLR's.

# 12 Tips for Better Vacation Photos

- 1. Make sure your batteries are fresh (if your camera uses Alkaline batteries) and fully charged (if your camera uses rechargeable Li-ion ones); We've all run out of power at one inopportune time or another but doing so while traveling can be devastating.
- **2. Bring extra media cards.** You don't want to face the decision of having to delete images or video clips to make room for new ones in the middle of your vacation.
- 3. Do your homework. Research the location if you aren't familiar with it. Once there, you can even ask the locals if there are any places off the beaten path that might make for interesting photographs or video. Taking maps or guidebooks with you on your trip? Take a photo of the family gathered together, with the maps and books spread out, as a fun way to start your vacation image capture.



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- 4. Have fun. Look for unique angles such as carefully climbing high above your subjects, or getting the camera low to the ground for a change in viewpoint. Take both video and stills when you do this for more variety.
- 5. Take some candid photos during the vacation of everyone having fun. You can capture great expressions and moments when your subject isn't aware that the camera is pointed at them.
- **6. Stabilize the camera whenever possible.** If your camera has VR (Vibration Reduction), turn it on.
- 7. Take a shot of the nearby signage so it will be easy for you to recall where you were for a specific photo or video.



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- 8. Zoom in on the details. Fill the frame with your entire subject. Fun photos at a market, for example, might be a shot where the entire image is a close up of one particular subject such as a basket of ripe fruit or veggies, or table full of souvenirs.
- **9. Shoot your food!** It's easy to take a great shot of a mouth-watering plate of food by using the Macro mode or zooming in tight on the dish. This is a fun photo you can take to remember the delicacies you enjoyed on your trip.
- 10. Take a variety of photos: wide establishing shots that show the whole scene, as well as photos that focus on one subject. This will help you tell a more complete story of your trip.
- 11. Pass the camera around. How will anyone know you were there if you stay behind the camera the entire time? Have others in your group take pictures or shoot video of you having fun too.



# 12. Follow these three easy rules of composition:

Rule of thirds: When you look through your viewfinder or at the LCD screen, imagine a tic-tactoe grid over the scene. The rule of thirds suggests that the points where the lines intersect are the best places to position your subject. Doing so will generally result in a pleasant and balanced composition;

Most pictures look better if the horizon is positioned above or below the middle of the frame, not directly in the centre of the image. The exception is when shooting a reflection;

When photographing people and animals it's best to have them looking into the frame

# 2. Adjust the ISO instead of using the flash

If you leave your camera on Automatic mode, you might notice the flash constantly going off which can result in washed-out colours and unnatural shadows across people's faces.

But if you try to disable the flash, your photos will often come out blurry or out of focus.

To fix this, [take your camera off auto so you can let the ISO automatically adjust or control it yourself.]

#### 1. Change your schedule

Have breakfast out and enjoy the beautiful sunshine. Kids up at the first ray of sunshine? Instead of telling them to be quiet, head out and explore during this period of magical light.

#### 2. Find open shade

Move your subjects to take advantage of the shade. Open shade is shade created with shade of a building, a tree or anything that casts a nice large shadow.



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# 3. Use a polarizing filter

Have you ever noticed that when you are wearing your sunglasses, the blue sky and green colours of the ocean are even more vivid? You can thank the polarising glass in your sunglasses for creating this effect, and the great news is you can also buy sunglasses for your camera- polarising filters.

BCCC Note: If you don't have a DSLR try holding your sunnies in front of your camera or phone.



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#### 4. Get creative in order to shade your subject

Why not experiment with using your body, or one of your handy kid helpers to shade your subject.

#### 5. Have the sun behind you

Having the sun behind you is the best way to get the most colour in your photos when shooting during the brightest parts of the day.

When you shoot into the sun you not only lose detail but it casts unwanted shadows.

If having the sun behind you doesn't work, try having the sun to the side instead of behind the subject.



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# 6. Use the middle of the day as nap time

If you nap after lunch you can recharge and head out again around 3 pm. Of course this doesn't always work, but if you can spend the height of the sun hours indoors recharging, having lunch and napping, you avoid the problem of the sun high in the sky.

#### 7. Shade and sun don't mix

- Get the bright light behind the photographer.
- Either get entirely in the shade, or entirely in the sunshine.



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#### 8. Reset your expectations

What are your real expectations for your travel photos? What do you want to feel when you look back at them? ......But more often that not, my day to day photography is for our memories only. They don't have to be of print quality or win any national geographic travel photography prize.



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# 9. Prioritise kid free photography time

I like to have my kids in our family photos, but sometimes I want a more cooperative subject who wont complain about having there photo taken.

#### 10. Don't use a flash

I almost never use a flash. Yes I have the bonus of having equipment that enables me to shoot in low light, but even when using my iPhone I never turn the flash on. A flash, when not used correctly, doesn't provide the most flattering light.
