At the AGM at the beginning of July, five Committee members were elected: Geoff Ellis as President, Ted Minty as Vice President, Glenda Minty as Secretary, Vic Spunner as Treasurer and Kate Harmon as 1st Ordinary Member, with no nominations for 2nd Ordinary Member. These last sound awful titles but it just means a Committee member who is not an office holder. Their role is to keep the whole Committee aware of the members' opinions, interests and concerns and as such are vital to the running of a good Committee of Management.

Background of New Committee Members:

Kate Harmon is an enthusiastic member of the BCAS camera group who has published a photographic book about the Bass Coast. Many of you may already know her.

Ted Minty and Glenda Minty were asked by Geoff Ellis in June 2023 to nominate for positions on the Committee of Management for BCAS at the upcoming July AGM. Though Ted had paid a membership fee in 2020 soon after the couple moved to Wonthaggi from Tallangatta in North East Victoria in April 2019, he had never received any acknowledgement or contact. Glenda volunteered at Art Space in early 2019 until early 2023 and this is where she and Ted met Geoff Ellis. They both became members of BCAS in June 2023.

The Minty's are retired secondary and tertiary teachers, farmers, tourism operators, horticulturalists and award winning cider and olive oil producers with keen interests in art and the natural world. Ted has continued his geological research after each of his retirements and likes to combine photography and geology.

They both have experience as Directors of Co- Operatives, and other management and leaderships positions in a range of community organizations, as well as running their own small businesses. Both are seasoned volunteers over many decades.

CHANGES: Since the AGM, Vic Spunner, Treasurer, has stepped down due to ill health and Geoff Ellis has stepped back from President due to conflict of interest when he was appointed to the Bass Coast Shire Council on the resignation of a sitting Councilor. Ted Minty has been acting as President Pro Tem and Acting Treasurer since the day Geoff Ellis was sworn into BCSC. This has necessitated the **Extra Ordinary General Meeting** before the **Spring General Meeting**, on the 7th of October., 1pm at the Goods Shed.

Beginning to SORTING THINGS OUT: Being new to BCAS it has been a vertiginous learning curve and a lot of hard work to get to grips with the organization. The secretary only got access to the email bcartistssociety@gmail.com in early September and has managed to build a membership data base with some detective work that would make Chief Inspector Barnaby proud. (Well it made me proud at any rate) There are only two names left without contact details: Sally Ahern and Andrew Keir.

There are still a few unconfirmed email addresses – so copies of this newsletter may just be wafting around in some unused corner of cyberspace while the intended recipient believes that BCAS has forgotten them. If you haven't already sent an email back to the email address above – please do so ASAP, so that I can do a "Bo-Peep" to find the lost lambs.

THE CARPET STRETCHING It took a while to get my head around the reason why all the "stuff" had to be moved out of the Goods Shed and then moved back in. It is because the floor is made of rough hewn sleepers the surface is not flat and level and carpet is the only floor covering that works. However the humps and hollows means that the carpet stretches over use and becomes hazardous to walk on. Hence the periodical stretching of the carpet back to a smooth(-ish) surface with minimal trip hazards.

But it has been a silver lined carpet-stretch in that the Shed has been re-arranged to suit the current user members better and the new Committee have had a chance to find stuff, lose stuff and find it again. All sorts of useful and not so useful like a box of chocolates use by Jan 2021!! And a bottle of bubble which will be on the menu on **Sunday** the 17th for the Nibble, Chat and Sip.

BIG THANKYOU to all those involved in packing up the STUFF from the goods shed, storing it and returning it. Brilliant work!!!

Report on discussions between Ted Minty (BCAS committee of management) and officers of BCSC; Shirley Egan, and Lucinda Cousens. On Thursday, September14 at Customer Service Centre, BCSC McBride St Wonthaggi.

The Bass Coast Shire Council is our landlord and under the new lease agreement they will require annual rent of \$340. The prior rent has been \$114 for many years. Under the existing lease we [BCAS] are responsible for maintenance of all above-ground fixtures and services. This increase in rent amounts to less than \$1 per day but in the context of our other charges {electricity, water supply, sewage, internet, insurance and RAV membership, post office box and general maintenance and consumables}, we are spending more money than we are taking in. This needs to turn around over the next 12 months or else BCAS will be bankrupt in the following 2-3years.

I made the case to BCSC that BCAS needs to reduce its operating costs and the largest single cost is electricity at \$500 per quarter and rising. BCAS membership fees raises about \$2000 per year which is totally consumed by our electricity charges alone.

A significant reduction in our electricity usage could be achieved by installation of a photovoltaic array onto the Goods Shed roof, as well as replacement of old fluorescent lights in parts of the Goods Shed and also installation of a heat-pump hot water system in lieu of our old gas service which operates off an old 15kg LPG bottle. Council pointed out that there were two methods which might achieve these outcomes. Firstly, a large community grant [one issued per year by BCSC] could provide up to \$10,000 but BCAS would have to find an additional 30% of any grant [about \$3000] as a condition of the grant. Alternately, BCSC could just go ahead and install the PV's [Solar Cells] onto the Goods Shed Roof as part of its commitment to upgrade Council properties in line with its 2020-2030 Climate Action Plan to reduce its carbon emissions to zero by 2030.

Shirley Egan recommended asking BCSC Building & Assets team to inspect the Goods Shed and assess what upgrades are applicable. Given that the Goods Shed is portion of the Wonthaggi Historical Railway Precinct, it is on the Victorian Historical Trust Register and they [BCSC] will need to negotiate with Heritage Victoria about installing PV's on the Goods Shed roof.

Another consideration is the fact that BCAS shares a power supply with Bass Coast Historical Society across the tracks. It is only in recent years that the Goods Shed has its own sub-board metering. Unfortunately, this meter is not a modern Smart-meter which is a prerequisite for any installation of PV. I told Council staff at the meeting that I had met with the Committee of Management of Bass Coast Historical Society [BCHS] earlier that morning and that they would support in principle our application to have photovoltaic panels installed on the Goods Shed roof. I put to Council the proposition that sufficient PV generating capacity should be installed on the Goods Shed roof to satisfy the power needs of both BCAS and BCHS, so that the output could be shared by BCAS and BCHS; both of which are small, community run, not for profit incorporated

bodies. Both organisations are sharing the same power supply line; they have limited financial means and both organisations have BCSC as landlord.

In response to graffiti on the walls of the Goods Shed, Council said they would look at it via their maintenance schedule. I offered to paint over the graffiti if Council could supply the appropriate paint.

In response to my concerns regarding the exorbitant costs associated with maintaining our Automatic External Defibrillator [AED] which amounts to an averaged annual cost of \$325 due to the necessity of replacing pads [\$350 per set] every 2 years and battery [\$600 per replacement] every 4 years as well as the absence of CPR training within BCAS; Council advised taking it to the tip. The company that supplied our AED no longer deals with the manufacturer of our machine due to these extreme costs. The AED when properly applied in a community setting with satisfactory application of CPR protocols may provide up to a 5% survival rate for cardiac failure. More than two minutes delay in applying CPR protocols in the event of cardiac failure usually results in brain death of the casualty. Council will not accept responsibility for maintenance of AED's or CPR training beyond those premises where their own employees are operating. I leave this topic for consideration by the next BCAS General meeting in October.

Council pushed the opportunity for BCAS to improve its earnings by providing more specific courses for its members and the general public and charging appropriate fees. These courses could be funded by a Quick Response Grant. This seems like a very useful means to provide high quality courses in fields such as photography and water colour technique and the Committee will research the needs of the membership and follow through on the advice tendered by Shirley Egan. I thank the council officers at the meeting on Thursday, 14th September for their advice and offers of assistance.



Devices utilized ranged from film camera, phones, digital camera, with or without changeable lenses to drones.


The times of the day that the photographs were taken ranged from first to last light.
